

#### **Inasmuch**

Edwin Markham was a celebrated American poet. He penned a



memorable poem about Conrad the Cobbler. Conrad was a dedicated Christian who loved people. One night he had a dream that Jesus Christ would come to his shop the next day. So he went out the next morning, gathered flowers, and decorated his simple shop.

Then Conrad prepared a meal for his honored guest: bread, honey and milk. But as the day went along, he was interrupted by an old man, a beggar. As a gesture of generosity and kindness, the cobbler invited him to come in out of the rain. His shoes were wet and worn, so Conrad gave him a new pair of shoes and sent him on his way.

## Jimmy and Laura Gentry

My wife and I have most recently served as missionaries with the International Mission Board. We served in East Asia (China) for the past eight years, but were recently asked to prayerfully consider transitioning from the IMB as part of their downsizing. After much prayer, we felt it was God's will for us to transition from the IMB, leave China, and return to the United States. We believe God has another special opportunity awaiting us which will allow us to serve His kingdom in strategic ways.

We know God is working in His church, and has strategically situated us in the body of Christ to be dynamically involved in His vision for building healthy multiplying disciples, healthy multiplying churches, and establishing His Church globally through the spread of His Gospel. Terry and Nan Williams

Recently retired Missionaries Terry and Nan Williams have returned from Tanzania where they had been assigned since 2001.

Terry has a double major in Animal Science and Agriculture Education and a Masters in Vocational Education from the University of Arkansas. He taught school from 1973 -2000 in Barton-Lexa Public School in Barton, AR, Mansfield High School in Mansfield, AR, and Fort Smith Public Schools.

Nan graduated from Mansfield High School in the same class as Terry. She graduated from Mellie's Beauty College in Fort Smith and worked in beauty shops in several locations before becoming the secretary at First Baptist Church in Mansfield for five years. She then was Personnel Clerk at AR Highway and Transportation Department for six years.

In September of 2000 the Williams were appointed as IMB missionaries and went to Shinyanga, Tanzania where they served from 2001 to 2008 and then to Kondo, Tanzania, from 2009 to 2015. Terry taught in a livestock training center and did chronological Bible storying. Nan worked with women and children storying in legacy church and women teaching cooking, grain storage and water purification.

## BIDS REQUESTED FOR CHURCH MISSION HOUSE

Upon the death of Linda McCullar in July, 2012, Barcelona Road Baptist Church became the owner of her residence at 1 San Clemente Circle in the Village. This house came to be known as the "Mission House."

In the July 15, 2015, business meeting, the church approved the recommendation of the Church Council "That the Church Trustees be authorized to supervise the sale of the mission house; that church members be offered an opportunity to purchase the house by a sealed bid process to be conducted over an announced period of time; and that if no church members are interested in the purchase, the house then will be offered for sale to the wider community."

The trustees are now inviting sealed bids from church members who are interested in purchasing the property. Bids should be addressed to the trustees and delivered to the church office prior to 11:00 a.m. on November 30 at which time the sealed bids will be opened. Trustees reserve the right to reject all bids.

No current professional appraisal has been made on the house. However, a local realtor has estimated that the sale value of the house should be in the \$85,000-\$90,000 range.
