From my heart to yours:

The "Old Barns"

An artist took a group of students to a beautiful hillside retreat. He told them their assignment was to capture the setting sun on canvas. Eagerly, the students set up their easels, took out their brushes, and began to paint. The artist moved from one canvas to another observing the students' progress. At last he came to the canvas of one student who was hard at work. Instead of painting the sunset, this student had centered his attention on an old barn in the foreground. Meticulously, he reproduced the shingles of the old barn as he saw them. The art teacher cautioned, "If you spend too much time on the old barn, you will miss the sunset."

The story is a parable of life. The "old barns" sometimes attract our attention and demand an investment of our time and energy. They even take the form of necessary activities and worth-while causes. But we must be careful not to lose sight of the most important purpose for living—serving our Lord faithfully.

During the closing service of a revival meeting, a man came forward to make a rededication of his life to the Lord. He confessed: "I've not had my priorities straight for some time now, preacher. I've been working hard to get ahead. I guess I've let my business become my god. Things are not good between my wife and me. Our children are resentful and rebellious. I want God to be first in my life again."

I watched this man's life over the next few months. He was true to his word. He honored his commitment to the Lord. His home situation improved. The joy of Christ returned to his life. God put us here on earth not just to live, but to live for Him.

"Freely You Have Received"

Jesus called his disciples, instructed them, and prepared to send them out to share his message. He reminded them, "Freely you have received, freely give" (Matthew 10:8). Life is a gift. Whoever we are, and all that we have, has come from the Lord. God owns everything. "The silver is Mine, and the gold is Mine, says the Lord of hosts" (Haggai 2:8). Again, God owns "the cattle on a thousand hills" (Psalm 50:10). Clearly, we are stewards or trustees of all that God has given to us. The benchmark for giving back to God is the tithe. "The tithe . . . is the Lord's. It is holy to the Lord" (Leviticus 27:30).

As a boy, I learned the importance of giving my tithe to the Lord through the church. This has been my pattern throughout the years; and I have never regretted it. I know my tithe supports the

ministries of my local church and makes it possible to share the Good News around the world. If you do not tithe your income, I encourage you to examine seriously this important biblical principle.

As a practical application, let me share that our tithes and faithful giving are needed by our church at this time. After a banner year of giving toward our new building (which we entered debt free), remodeling older space for Sunday School classrooms (also paid for), and supporting mission offerings in a generous way, we find ourselves struggling to make budget during January and February. In fact, our giving is below expenses. Sometimes folks assume that budget giving is on solid ground, and so they direct generous gifts to special offerings.

During January, we had to replace an air handling unit at a cost of \$5,900. It is hard to believe, but our church plant has 18 air handling units. We end up replacing on average two or three units each year. Also, we need to remember that when budget giving is down it affects giving to missions. Our gifts to The Cooperative Program and Central Baptist Association are based on a percentage of budget receipts. Therefore, when offerings are down, less money goes toward mission causes.

Please consider the ongoing budget needs as you give. I know you will want to make this a matter of prayer.

We welcome the Andrews to Barcelona Road Baptist Church and know they'll be a wonderful addition.



Do you or anyone you know have breathing difficulties? There are a number of lung diseases, but the most common is asthma. Most people do not realize how something that we use on a regular basis can cause someone we care about to end up in distress or even in the Emergency Room. Most of us take breathing for granted - it's so easy and we don't have to put forth an effort or even think about it. But to those with fragile lungs, we have to keep an eye (or nose) out for the culprits that cause us distress and suffering.

Here is a list of just a few things that can cause problems:

- -hair spray
- -perfumes
- -cleaning supplies (bleach is a big one!)
- -flowers
- -seasonal allergies
- -cigarette smoke

Our body has a natural defense system to protect our lungs and keep germs at bay; however, here is a list of things you can do to keep your lungs healthy.

- -Quit smoking
- -Avoid exposure to indoor pollutants that can damage your lungs (as per the above list)
- -Minimize exposure to outdoor air pollution (seasonal allergies) - check local weather on a daily basis
- -Prevent infection wash your hands, stay away from crowds when you're sick, good oral hygiene, keep at a distance (if you're sick, stay home!)
- -Get regular healthcare/check-ups
- -Take your prescribed medications as directed. (Keep your metered dose inhaler with you at all times; you never know when you will come into contact with an irritant.)
- -Get vaccinated for the flu and pneumonia



March is the month when we typically celebrate our Irish heritage - even if we aren't Irish! If you are interested in seeing how our lives have been impacted by those from the Emerald Isle, you will enjoy How the Irish Saved Civilization: "the untold story of Ireland's heroic role from the fall of Rome to the rise of medieval Europe (the hinges of history)".

Every year, millions of Americans celebrate St. Patrick's Day, but they may not be aware of how great an influence St. Patrick was

on the subsequent history of civilization. Not only did he bring Christianity to Ireland, he instilled a sense of literacy and learning that would create the conditions that allowed Ireland to become "the isle of saints and scholars" -- and thus preserve Western culture while Europe was being overrun by barbarians.

If history isn't your thing, how about some Irish-themed fiction? For instance:

The Emerald Ballad series by B. J. Hoff, including Song of the Silent Harp, Heart of the Lonely Exile, and Land of a Thousand Dreams. This historical fiction illustrates what immigrants went through to make a life in America and what they endured in Ireland.

<u>In the Company of Others</u> by Jan Karon. This is a Mitford/Father Tim book set in Ireland, where Father Tim and his wife find an old journal which they find brings Ireland to life, including life in Ireland, forgiveness, reconciliation, sacrifice and deep love.

Minding Frankie by Maeve Binchy. A warm-hearted tale of love, noble behavior and sacrifice for others.
