From My Heart to yours:

In Robert Frost's poem "The Road Not Taken" a traveler tells how he came to a fork in the road. Gazing

ahead as far as he could see, he made a decision:

I shall be telling this with a sigh. Somewhere ages and ages hence: Two roads diverged in a wood, and I— I took the one less traveled by,

And that has made all the difference. The road not taken lies before us. Yes, it does make a difference which road we decide to travel through life. Let us focus on two profound verses found in Joshua 3. "For you have not passed this way before" (4b). Then Joshua added: "Sanctify yourselves, for tomorrow the Lord will do wonders among you" (5).

The setting was this. The Israelites were encamped along the banks of the Jordan River at the border of the Promised Land. God had delivered them from bondage in Egypt. No longer were they subject to Pharaoh, the cruel taskmaster. The days of wandering in the wilderness were behind them. Before them lay a land "flowing with milk and honey." God's promise was about to be realized. The day of march had come.

Like the Israelites, we stand at the border of a new beginning. The road not taken, the year 2022, lies ahead of us. As we march into the new year, there will be many new experiences to face, problems to solve, tasks to perform, trials to endure, opportunities to grasp, sorrows to bear, joys to share, and blessings to receive. What does the New Year offer?

It is a time for taking inventory. I recall my experience as a teenager when I worked in retail with Penney's in Fayetteville. During January, we took inventory to determine the amount of stock on hand. How much more should we be willing to take stock of our lives. The New Year provides a time for reflection. Who am I? What am I here for? Where am I going? What have I accomplished with my life? What about my relationships with others, family, friends, work associates, church folks, and God? Are there changes I need to make? Resolve with God's help, guided by His Spirit, to be a better person. It is a time of new beginning. I can identify with the words of Louisa Fletcher Tarkington, "I wish there were some wonderful place called the land of beginning again, where all our mistakes and all our heartaches, and all our selfish grief could be dropped like a shabby old coat at the door, and never put on again." Well, there is; and we can. One of the most powerful lessons in Scripture is that God is willing to forgive and give us second chances. David, Peter, Paul and others remind us of this truth.

It is also a time of rededication. Joshua said, "Sanctify yourselves, for tomorrow the Lord will do wonders among you." Renew your vows. Make a commitment to God. Turn over a new leaf. Chart a different course. Allow God to make a difference through you. Be a blessing to others. Give more time to Bible study and prayer. Serve the Lord faithfully and minister to others.

Artist William Hunt had a class of students on a hillside painting a sunset. He walked from student to student looking over their shoulders as they labored over their canvasses. At last, he came to one student who was meticulously painting the shingles of an old barn on the hillside. The artist interrupted the student and reminded him, "If you waste too much time painting the shingles on the old barn, you will miss painting the sunset." Now is the time to put aside what is irrelevant and inconsequential and focus on what really matters. The Lord will help us.



If your resolution is to read more this year, any of these would be a great start!

<u>Birds of Pray</u> (the story of the Philadelphia Eagles' faith, brotherhood, and Super Bowl victory) - by Rob Maaddi. They were the first No. 1 seed in NFL history to enter the playoffs as an underdog. Their star quarterback was out with a season-ending knee injury. Five-time Super Bowl champions the New England Patriots towered over them. But public opinion didn't matter to the Philadelphia Eagles. They believed in each other. The band of Christian brothers on the team believed in the God of the impossible, and they played for an audience of One. <u>Birds of</u> <u>Pray</u> follows the deep faith shared among players, the high stakes they faced together, and their relentless reliance on Christ who gives all strength in moments of crisis and celebration alike. The result is a boldly inspiring, entertaining read that will challenge readers to go deeper in their faith, dream bigger, and live with renewed courage for whatever odds life stacks against them.

<u>Unexpected: Leave Fear Behind, Move Forward in Faith, Embrace the Adventure</u> - by Christine Caine. Is it possible to have peace in an uncertain world? To not only expect the unexpected, but embrace it? Most of us want to have life under control, but God wants us to anticipate the unexpected with a faith deeply rooted in his goodness. In <u>Unexpected</u>, the author helps us walk into the life God has for us - unknowns and all. Using dramatic examples from her own journey, Christine offers real-life strategies and Biblical inspiration to help you.


