Encouragers Needed

The writer of Hebrews has reminded us to “encourage one another” (Hebrews 10:25). We all need encouragers. We all ought to be encouragers.

Barnabas is a biblical example of an encourager. In fact, his name means “Son of Encouragement” (Acts 4:36). How is that for a nickname! Barnabas encouraged Paul, John Mark, and others in significant ways.

One day years ago my telephone rang. Elizabeth Teas was on the other end of the line. “John died today,” she said sadly. She wanted to know if I would preach his funeral. As I made the long trip by car, I thought about how much John Teas had meant to my life.

I began my ministry in Fayetteville at age eighteen. What qualifies a college sophomore to lead a church? Not much! Brother Teas was a faithful member of that church. Previously, he had served as its by-vocational pastor. Once he said to me, “Jon, the Lord called me to preach when I was young, but I didn’t respond until I reached middle age. By then, precious years of service were lost. I can’t relive those years, but I can try to live them through you.”

John Teas was a faithful encourager and friend. He taught me how to share Christ with others. He gave me helpful feedback on my first attempts at preaching. (A multi-volume set of Spurgeon’s sermons was his idea for a Christmas gift from the church to me). He offered specific suggestions on how to make baptism and the Lord’s Supper more meaningful in worship. He made me aware of the fundamentals of parliamentary procedure. Would you trust an eighteen-year-old to moderate a church business meeting?

Most of all, John Teas knew how to pray. Private times of prayer with him were high spiritual moments. His public prayers always lifted the congregation to God’s throne of grace. Without a doubt, I knew he was praying daily for me. He practiced Paul’s admonition to “pray without ceasing” (1 Thessalonians 5:17).



As I stood at the grave with the Teas family, tears streamed down my face. Along with them I felt a deep sense of loss. Someone from my formative years had departed. Years have passed, but I still miss the words and encouragement of John Teas.

You have received encouragement. Will you also be an encourager to others? You can make a difference in their lives.

Once again, our friends from Teen Challenge will be with us to lead in worship on July 10. We are grateful for the way this ministry touches the lives of teens and younger men for Christ. Hygiene items are the focus this month for the shoeboxes.

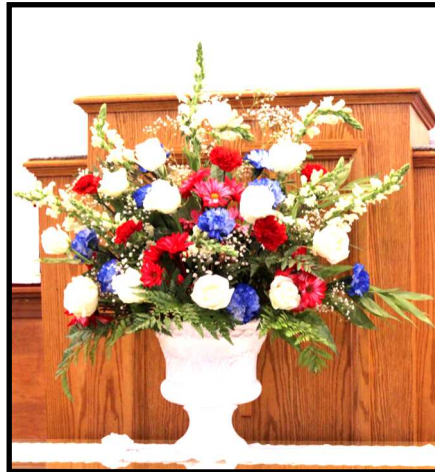


Other items which can be included in the boxes are: wash cloths, unscented bar soap (no liquids), clothing, hygiene items, school supplies, colors, coloring books.

As we celebrate and thank God for our country's independence, take a little time to visit our library where we have lots of great books including the following:

Legacy of Sunset Cove series by Melody Carlson:

Harbor Secrets- Set on the Oregon coast in 1916, Anna McDowell and her daughter Katy are returning to Anna's hometown from Portland when Anna's estranged father has a stroke. Anna takes over as editor of his newspaper and soon comes to realize the town is harboring some dangerous secrets.

Riptide Rumors - As autumn of 1916 descends upon the once-peaceful town of Sunset Cove, Anna has great hopes that the excitement of the summer will be over now that a few of the key players in the rum-running ring have been arrested. But with a daring jailbreak getting the town in a dither again, she knows that the danger hasn't passed for anyone in her coastal hometown.

Surf Smugglers - In the summer of 1917, US troops join the allied forces in the Great War. Back in Sunset Cove, other battles wage. Anna McDowell continues to fight old-fashioned stereotypes as she runs a newspaper committed to truth. Despite opposition, she's determined to expose ongoing rum-running and prohibition lawlessness. Anna's concern that her daughter is growing up too fast is confirmed when Katy's romantic life takes an unexpected turn, which Anna fears is influenced by the pressure of a devastating war that is not only changing the entire world but Sunset Cove as well.

Turning Tide - As the Great War rages on, Sunset Cove continues to feel its impact. Running the small town newspaper, Anna McDowell can't escape the grim reports from the other side of the world, but home-front challenges abound as well. Even as the war winds down, the costs are high—and Sunset Cove is not spared.
