Blessings We Enjoy

We enjoy a number of blessings. 1. Our church is characterized by biblical and theological integrity and a commitment to historic Baptist convictions. 2. Our church stands for God-centered worship. We exalt the Lord through inspiring music and the preached Word. 3. Our church is financially strong because our members believe in tithing and sacrificial giving. 4. Our church is known for its ministry to its members and to others. We are a loving, caring congregation willing to "rejoice with those who rejoice; weep with those who weep" (Romans 12:15). Our Deacons faithfully minister to their families and Sunday School classes look after their members. 5. Our church is blessed with the opportunity to minister to children and teens and their families. 6. Our church is engaged in significant efforts in missions, both locally and around the world.

7. Our church is congregation-led with folks exercising their gifts in a variety of ways through ministries and programs, committees and teams.

8. Our church seeks to reach all ages: to bring people to Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord, and to help them grow in discipleship.

Challenges We Face

We face significant challenges. 1. We need to continue to improve our image and recognition in the community. Retirees make up the core of our church. Therefore, we must continue to reach new retirees who move to HSV to replace those who depart either through death or who, after developing health problems, relocate to be nearer to children. 3. Sunday School and Morning Worship attendance have slipped since the beginning of Covid. We need to reach out and reclaim folks who once were faithful in attendance, but now are absent. Are you faithful in attendance? There may be truth in these words: "Every time I pass the church, I stop in for a visit so that when I'm carried home, the Lord won't say, 'Who is it?" 4. We are reaching fewer children and teens than we once did. Houses in the west side of the Village are filled with young families who need the Lord and our caring concern. 5. We must undergird everything we do with fervent, heartfelt prayer. Will you be a prayer warrior? Have you considered becoming a part of our Prayer Room ministry?



JANUARY 2023

Forget the former things; do not dwell on the past. See, I am doing a new thing! Now it springs up; do you not perceive it? I am making a way in the wilderness and streams in the wasteland. -

~Isaiah 43:18-19

The Orphan Girl (a WWII novel of courage found and a promise kept) by Kurt Palka - Kate Henderson, an energetic and spirited young woman, is a trained paramedic and ambulance driver who does her work courageously and with determination, even though underneath she is still wrestling with grief after witnessing the shooting death of her father seven years earlier. Her father's murder was never properly investigated and it remains unsolved. Kate's life is interrupted when she wakes up one night to the sound of the air raid alarm and the terror whistles of a bomb's stabilizers screaming toward the roof of her house. Kate survives but is injured. Her house is gone as well, and after her time in the hospital, Claire Giroux, a kind doctor and family friend, invites Kate to live with her as she recuperates. This arrangement works well for them until a few months later when Claire's husband comes home from the war. Within days, the lives of both women are drastically altered and events are set in motion, both in England and in Canada, that challenge Kate and Claire to their limits.

Rebekah Ann Naylor, M. D. - Missionary Surgeon in Changing Times by Camille Lee Hornbeck - What one life intertwined with serving God and the people of India can do . . . This extraordinary story of Rebekah Ann Naylor, M.D. is an almost palpable personification of what God's call can yield in the life of one committed individual. As a pastor/seminary-president's daughter, Naylor's early years are shaped by those who view one's calling as inviolable. Believing God wants her to be a missionary physician, she becomes the first woman to graduate from the surgical residency program at University of Texas Southwestern Medical School. As a single female in the alien country of India and as a medical pioneer, Naylor helps develop Bangalore Baptist Hospital and then is administrator and surgeon there. Her absolute faith in God propels this multi-gifted missionary through ultimate challenges--including sometimes incessant and complex government red tape involved in keeping the hospital going. Giving up and failing are never in Naylor's vocabulary, even though she ultimately finds herself having to flex with a vastly different era of missions strategy than the one in which she joined Southern Baptist's International Mission Board. This contemporary, awe-inspiring yet vastly human hero of the faith perseveres in circumstances that send others home--who for more than 30 years thoroughly gives herself to the people of India and whose life beckons others to follow in her footsteps.

Burden of Proof by Davis Bunn - Three weeks after his twenty-third birthday, Ethan missed the chance to save his brother's life when he was murdered on the steps of the courthouse in Jacksonville, Florida. Ever since that fateful day, Ethan has sensed a deep disconnect between the man he should have been and the one he has become. His days play out a beat too slow, his mind replaying the scene of his failure again and again. But when his brother's widow appears asking for his help in uncovering what was really behind his brother's death, Ethan is stunned to hear that she and her late husband were involved in a much larger case than he knew--one that threatens the global power structure. As Ethan joins the search for answers, he will enter into his own past--and discover a means of redeeming his future.
