

#### Serving By Giving

A farmer hurried from the barn to the house. Excitedly, he reported to his wife that their best cow had given birth to twin calves, one red and the other white.

The farmer acknowledged: "God has richly blessed us with two calves. I believe we ought to dedicate one of them to the Lord." He continued: "We'll raise the calves together. After they are grown, we'll sell them and keep the proceeds from one for ourselves and give the money from the other to the Lord."

This sounded like a wonderful idea to the wife, but she wanted to know which calf belonged to the Lord. "Oh, we don't have to decide that now," the farmer replied. "We'll treat both the same, and everything will work out fine."

A few months later the farmer entered the kitchen with a miserable expression on his face. His wife asked what was wrong. Sadly, he lamented: "I have some terrible news. The Lord's calf is dead!"

His wife exclaimed: "But I thought you hadn't decided which was to be the Lord's calf." "Oh, yes," the man replied, "I determined all along that the Lord's calf was the white one, and it is the white one that died."

This story evokes a smile or two, but it also conveys an important spiritual truth. Unless we are careful, the Lord's calf is always the one that dies! We need to keep our priorities in order, especially in the area of Christian stewardship.

Jesus was a keen observer of people. One day he watched as worshipers gave their offerings. The rich shared large sums of money, but a poor widow who came along put in two copper coins worth less than a penny. The fact that the woman gave two coins is significant. She might have kept one for herself! Turning to the disciples, Jesus announced, "I just saw the biggest offering of the day." Eagerly, they asked: "How much was it, lord?" He replied: "A couple of copper coins." Imagine their surprise. Then the Lord explained that others gave out of their abundance, while the widow gave all that she had (Mark 12:41-44).

What does this woman's generosity teach us? Even people who do not have great wealth can use their money to serve God. Our Lord is not concerned about the size of the gift, but the spirit of the giver. Most churches do not depend on the large gifts of a few; rather, they depend on the smaller gifts of the many. The widow's response reminds us that no gift is too small to count. It also makes us aware that no Christian is excused from giving to the Lord's work.

A missionary was showing American tourists around the place where he served. They passed a field where they saw an old man guiding a crude wooden plow through a rice paddy. The plow was not being pulled by an animal, but by a boy!

One tourist commented: "I suppose this family is very poor." The missionary replied: "This father and son wanted to help build their church, but they had no money. So, they sold their ox and gave the price of the sale to the church. Now they pull the plow themselves."

"What a sacrifice," one traveler exclaimed. "They did not think of it that way," the missionary replied. "They were grateful to have an ox to sell."

May the Lord guide us as we consider our giving to the Lord's work through Barcelona Road Baptist Church. We are preparing a 2023 budget for consideration; and we also need to finish strong during the remaining months of this year.

<u>Stories from Papa Great</u> -by <u>Elton Gray</u> - Learn how our own Elton Gray grew up, became a Christian, met his beloved wife Dottie and became a minister. He also tells us about his years serving in Okinawa and how he came to reside in Hot Springs Village.

Extraordinary Measures (DVD) is about a family with two children, both of whom have a terminal, genetic disorder and have a matter of months to live. Their father (Brendan Fraser) researches the disorder as best he can. He finally locates an eccentric scientist (Harrison Ford) a professor at a university, whom he believes can invent a drug and bring the drug to market in time to save the lives of his children. He quits his job and makes this quest his number one priority. It is a race against the clock with many twists and turns in the plot.

<u>Chasing Shadows</u> by Lynn Austin - A wonderful story of courage, love, & faith, set in the Nazi-occupied country of the Netherlands during WW 2. We see life from the perspectives of 3 different viewpoints - the Jews who had to go into hiding, the brave Dutch people who hid them, and the Resistance workers who put their lives on the line every day to save others. *Chasing Shadows* celebrates the courage, fortitude, and endurance of those who lived through this dark time. Ultimately, it is book about hope in the most hopeless of situations.

<u>High Sierra Sweethearts</u> series by Mary Conneally:

<u>The Accidental Guardian</u> -Trace Riley is the self-appointed watchdog for a wilderness trail, having been the lone survivor of an attack years before. Deborah Harkness now finds herself in a similar position, having been able to rescue only herself, her younger sister, and two small children from a slaughter. With winter just around the corner, they must depend on Trace, whose bachelor cabin is the only shelter around. Together they brave weather, marauders...and face mixed feelings about the day the ladies will leave.

<u>The Reluctant Warrior</u> - Union army officer Cameron Scott is used to being obeyed, but nothing about this journey to Lake Tahoe has gone as expected. He's come to fetch his daughter and nephew and seek revenge on the people who killed his brother. Instead, he finds himself trapped by a blizzard with two children who are terrified of him and stubborn but beautiful Gwen Harkness, who he worries may be trying to keep the children.

<u>The Unexpected Champion</u> - City dweller John McCall never expected to be out in the High Sierras of 1868 on a wild-goose chase to find the Chiltons' supposedly lost grandson. But now that he's out here, things have gotten even more complicated, mostly due to wildcat Penny Scott. She's not like any woman he's ever met-comfortable in the woods, with a horse, and with a gun.
