From my heart to yours:

Defining Success

How do you define success? For many people the answer is expressed in these four words: possessions, prestige, position, and power. These four p's constitute the current definition of success.

According to popular opinion, a successful person is one who holds the best job, oversees the most employees, and commands the largest income. This person wears fashionable clothes, drives a luxury automobile, lives in the best part of town, and belongs to exclusive clubs. Ours is a success-oriented society.

Jesus defined success in terms of servant-hood. Concerning himself, he said, "For the Son of man also came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many" (Mark 10:45). Jesus also said of his followers, "Whoever would be great among you must be your servant, and whoever would be the first among you shall be servant of all" (Mark 10:43-44).

A story from the life of B. H. Carroll, who founded and was the first president of Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, illustrates the servant spirit. A guest in Carroll's home, upon retiring, put his shoes outside the bedroom door. Evidently, he was used to having a housekeeper shine them while he slept. The Carroll household had no servants.

Dr. Carroll noticed the shoes, picked them up, and took them to the kitchen table. He was polishing them when his guest unexpectedly walked in. Had Dr. Carroll not been caught in the act, his guest never would have known who had shined his shoes. The humble theologian and preacher demonstrated greatness through his service.

Bill Wallace also was a remarkable servant of the Lord. He responded to God's call to work as a missionary in China. As a skilled surgeon, he dedicated himself to bring healing to broken lives. As a faithful witness of the Great Physician, he shared the good news of salvation. Then the Communist takeover came. Having refused to leave his patients, Bill Wallace was arrested, tortured, and put to death.

His Chinese friends could not forget Wallace's Christlike influence. Over his grave they erected a marker with these words: "For to me to live is Christ" (Philippians 1:21). This verse was a fitting epitaph for a life totally sold out to Christ.

Using Paul's affirmation, let's substitute for the word "Christ" any of the four p's mentioned above. "For me to live is position." "For me to live is possessions," and so on. Then let's complete the rest of the verse, "And to die is gain." When we do this, none of the four p's are true. Only when we are willing to say, "For me to live is Christ" can we then add, "and to die is gain." We must decide what or who gives meaning to our lives.

Sermons on the Gospels

Beginning on August 28, I will preach a sermon on each of the four Gospels. We will begin with Mark, the earliest Gospel, and continue with Matthew, Luke, and John. I will highlight the distinctive characteristics and content of each Gospel. You will want to read each of the Gospels in preparation for or as a follow-up to the sermons. May the Lord bless us as we seek to learn more about the life and teachings of Jesus.

<u>Armando's Treasure</u> by Melody Carlson - Dora Chase is an eighty-year-old widow whose family finds her frustratingly independent. Her son no longer trusts her judgment and constantly pressures her to sell her rural home and rundown farm to a huge computer firm. When a young stranger shows up, Dora is suspicious, but before long Armando Garcia wins her trust. And Armando supports Dora's independence, causing the conflict within her bickering family to escalate. Dora's son abhors Armando's interference and is determined to send him away. He suspects the charming young man is running from something or someone. And he's not far from wrong. The unlikely friendship that grows between the elderly widow and the young man with a past leads them both on a journey toward hope, healing and forgiveness.

Angel Song by Sheila Walsh & Kathryn Cushman - Ann Fletcher has returned to Charleston to see her younger sister Sarah receive her master's degree. But she soon finds herself riding in the back of an ambulance, watching helplessly as Sarah fights for her life. As they race to the hospital, Sarah talks to someone who is not there...and hums a melody Ann has never heard before. That unfamiliar, unearthly beautiful melody keeps finding Ann--first in the hospital chapel, then in her dreams, and finally in Sarah's empty house. Two neighbors have a profound effect on Ann. Ethan McKinney lends her a shoulder to lean on. And as a carpenter, he volunteers to help Ann get the Fletcher family home into shape for selling. His strong presence is a pleasing distraction. Ann's twelve-year-old neighbor, Keith, has Down Syndrome and the guile to believe he can actually see and hear angels. In fact, he insists they are looking out for her in ways she's never imagined. God begins to reveal himself to Ann--both in her newfound friends and through supernatural events. As she discovers the very real presence of angels around her, will she finally open her heart to receive God's healing love?

I Saw the Lord: A Wakeup Call for Your Heart by Anne Graham Lotz - When we call ourselves Christians, we expect that our love for Jesus, our hunger for His presence, our urgent longing to see Him again will be a constant, motivating force in our lives. Yet sometimes . . . in the busyness of our days or the duties of our jobs or the familiar habits of our worship or the everyday routine of our homes, the longing becomes complacency, and we sleep through opportunities to be with Him.
